David P. Wacker, professor of pediatrics in the UI Carver College of Medicine, received the Arc of the United States 2002 Distinguished Research Award for research in the field of mental retardation.



The University's fall 2003 enrollment was 29,745: 20,233 undergraduates, 5,470 graduate students, and 4,042 professional students. They came from all 99 Iowa counties, 50 states, and 115 countries. More than 63 percent were Iowa residents.

Edward Bell, professor of pediatrics in the UI Carver College of Medicine and director of the Neonatal Intensive Care Unit in Children's Hospital of Iowa, received the Humanism in Medicine Award from the Association of American Medical Colleges. Bell also received the UI Carver College of Medicine's Faculty Humanism in Medicine Award.
