Fuguitt (CDE Working Paper No. 2008-09, 2008, .pdf format, p.). Abstract Older Blacks migrated to onmetropolitan (nonmetro) communities in the 1990s to a degree not true of the past. Some of the nonmetro counties that attracted them are well-known retirement areas also favored by other retirees, mostly Whites. Two-thirds of Black retirement counties, however, are areas in the Old South that are not attracting other retirees at a substantial rate, if at all.
